At the end of each street was a list of that street's servicemen.

We also had a display at the Broadway Baptist Church Hall, showing a complete set of the panels, the soldier's and nurse's uniforms pictured above and a selection of information and objects, some on loan from the School Library Service (information below).

During the event, free advice on researching family history was available from Kevin Brown. More information on this is given below.

As part of the open house event we held a popup exhibition around the area - attaching information panels to hedges, lampposts, railings and gates – some people were kind enough to "host" information panels in their

We also had a small display of artefacts from the time, watched over by a "<u>VAD</u> nurse" and "soldier".

It was great to meet and talk to people about our project – in some cases we were able to find out extra information or we met descendants of those we have researched.

Ernest Hallam's granddaughter came all the way from Hertfordshire to view our exhibition and visit the area again – she just missed meeting members of Chester Green Local History Society who will be

able to give her more information on the school where Ernest taught when he returned from the war.

# **Researching Family History**

Alongside our display we were fortunate to have the services of Kevin Brown of <u>Relative Strangers</u> who was on hand to give free advice on tracing your family history, whether military or just historical.

#### Forthcoming Family History Course

and Other Services offered by Kevin Brown

Kevin is hoping to run a WEA course locally on researching family history, if there

is sufficient interest. Details as follows:-

"Family History" is a beginner's course but welcomes the more experienced too. Probably over 7-11 weeks. Cost between £45 and £80 but free places available to any in receipt of means-tested benefits. Includes learning about census, civil registration and how to use Ancestry effectively.

### "About Ordinary People with Ordinary Lives" Evaluation of our History Trail Event

More than 600 people saw at least some of the 34 information panels when walking through the six streets area during the Arts Trail weekend on 27 and 28 June, and many more while they remained on display until Thursday 2 July. 344 people visited the WWI exhibition at Broadway Baptist Church.

Respondents of our Evaluation Questionnaire scored the event at 9.2 out of 10 for information and knowledge gained.

Evaluations and comments included:

Gave me a real sense of how people relate to local history.

Very useful speaking to the genealogist.

The street displays made the history very locally relevant – ie next to houses we know.

We are thrilled to have the story of someone who actually lived in this house – that we have just moved into – and to know their story.

It is so good to see the panels near the actual house where someone (who served in WWI) lived, to think of them stepping out of that door to go to war, or possibly coming home on leave or for good. It does make it feel so real.

It was interesting reading the stories because it wasn't history about big people but about ordinary people with ordinary lives which the war changed for ever.

# School Library Service

### Derbyshire and Derby City Library and Museums Loans Service

As you can see from the photographs of our exhibition room at the Broadway Baptist Church, we were fortunate to be able to borrow, very locally on Kedleston Road, the two mannequins, the replica costumes, and a variety of posters and original artefacts relevant to our own research project.

# PLACES TO VISIT

The history team are taking a break over the summer, but we thought you might like a few suggestions about places to visit.



## **Dunham Massey**

Dunham Massey is the Stamford Military Hospital at Altrincham, Cheshire, WA14 4SJ, Tel 01283 792333. This is a National Trust site.

In World War 1, the stately home and estate of Dunham Massey was converted into an auxiliary hospital – The Stamford

Military Hospital. During the period of the war, almost 300 sick or injured soldiers passed through this hospital. Luckily, the family who owned Dunham Massey kept and archived many detailed patient records, diaries, and artefacts: from these the National Trust have reconstructed a ward, the nurses' station and the dining/social area.

This exhibition is very creatively presented, with audio clips, written texts, (including some embroidered on pillows), patient summaries on each bed, and reconstructions of equipment such as that for draining open wounds, or shielding amputations. There are also short role plays performed whilst visitors are in the spaces, which give authentic and nuanced interpretations of scenarios which might have been common in most auxiliary hospitals, such as a nurse reading a letter to a soldier who has been blinded, or a recruiting sergeant visit to check if any of the patients can be released back to the Front soon, as manpower was desperately short.

Besides this WW1 related section, there are other rooms of interest in the House,

and there are also excellent gardens and a large deer park to explore.

Dunham Massey is free for National Trust members but has charges for nonmembers. Although quite a long journey (allow 1.5 hours by car) it is well worth planning a day visit. Do let us know what you think too if you go.

The "Stamford Military Hospital" is open Saturday to Wednesday until 11 November, but there may be timed tickets when it is busy so do check the website for full details, or phone to confirm.

# **The National Memorial Arboretum**

The National Memorial Arboretum is set within 150 acres of maturing woodland within the National Forest on Croxall Road, Alrewas, Staffordshire, DE13 7AR (near Lichfield).



There is a self guided World War One trail, including specific regimental memorials, as well as poignant ones such as "Shot at Dawn".

Visit their website to get a full range of events and to check on the facilities. Children are welcome with a play area and kid's guide available. Guided tours are available; wheelchairs and scooter are available to hire.

Open daily (9 am to 5 pm in the summer months), entry is free, with parking £3.



# **Kedleston Hall**

Kedleston Hall, Derby DE22 5JH, is hosting an exhibition, <u>Derbyshire</u> <u>Remembers</u>, which is a National Trust event, exploring the story of how the First War changed the lives of local people 100 years ago.

The exhibition, in the Billiard Room, was

curated by Primary School children who selected themes that interested them, including "Horrible WW1 Hospitals", Trench Art, writing their own letters home from soldiers, role-playing the panels at Military Service Tribunals and reading newspaper accounts of the Zeppelin Raid on Derby City.

This is a really worthwhile visit for families. Fifth Word theatre company deserves recognition for the skilful design and coordination of the project, which they led in partnership with the National Trust, the Derbyshire Record Office, Derby Local Studies Library, Dale and Sudbury Primary Schools and some key volunteer adults. Booking is not needed. Normal admission prices apply (free to National Trust members). Details of opening times etc can be found on the <u>Derbyshire Remembers website</u>.

### **Derby Local Studies and Family History Library Re-Opened**

The Derby <u>Local Studies and Family History Library</u> has now re-located to premises opposite the Council House, round the corner from Full Street at Riverside Chambers, and is open to the public again.
